

Gear up for a busy summer! Your guide to 2001 events



Participation in the Theodore Tug Boat day at the Museum of Civilization on June 17 is just one of several new club activities for 2001.

While the official start of boating season is usually the Victoria Day weekend in May, 30°C temperatures at the end of April and beginning of May saw many boaters getting an early start at Andrew Hayden Park. Summer is definitely here, so charge those batteries and plan to join us at the pond!

The official start of the Rideau Nautical Modellers boating season is usually marked by a two-day run and demonstration at the Ottawa Tulip Festival. However, the club has decided not to participate in the Tulip Festival this year. A week before the event, the club executive was very concerned with the lack of coordination by Tulip Festival organizers. There were many details to arrange but the Tulip Festival staff had the Rideau Nautical Modellers very low on

their priority list. Many phone calls to organizers were not returned, so it was decided to abandon this event. However, it is still going to be a busy summer, commencing with the two-day event at Nepean Days. on June 16 and 17.

There are also several new events this summer. On June 17. several club members will be participating in a Theodore Tug Boat day at the Museum of Civilization. This Father's Day event will be using the club's portable pond and volunteers are required to help set up and take down the pond. (Call Tony if you can help.)

Sometime mid-summer, the club will be participating in a large company picnic for WebPlan, a large high-tech firm in Ottawa. The exact date has yet to be determined. The Museum of Civilization have asked the club to participate in an event during the long civic weekend at the beginning of August. (We'll use the full 16' x 32' portable pond for this event.) And the club will also be joining the Barrie Model Yacht Club for their annual regatta on August 25. It is hoped that many members will make the trek to Barrie for this event.

Regular Tuesday night runs at Andrew Hayden Park officially commence on May 22. However, a good number of club members have been taking advantage of some beautiful Tuesday evenings and have already been putting the pond at Andrew Hayden Park to good use.

August 25, 2001 - Were in Barrie, Ontario for the Barrie Model Yacht Club's annual regatta.

An affordable submarine from Dumas

Until now, getting started in submarines was a costly affair. You could plan on spending from \$500 to \$800 for a submarine kit. Now, Dumas Boats offers a complete submarine kit for only \$199. Available at Dynamic Hobbies off of Colonnade Road, beginners can have a

quality, professional looking submarine without suffering from sticker shock.



The Dumas USS Bluefish submarine is a 33 inch long model of a Gato/Balao class submarine. It has a beam of 4 in ches and weighs

approximately five pounds ready to run. This dynamic diving sub has a maximum diving depth of four feet depending on water conditions.


The kit contains vacuum formed parts including hull, deck, motor mounts and sails, two 4.8 volt electric motors and complete drive line hardware. All you'll need to be in the water is a 3 channel radio, speed control and battery pack.

Did you know that TV's Theodore Tugboat is now a real tug?

Theodore Tugboat really is a boat and the 20 metre tug was launched in April 2000 at the historic shores of the LeHave River in Bridgewater, Nova Scotia. The boat, Theodore Too, is a full-size replica of the star of the popular children's TV show, complete with smiling face, moving eves and red baseball cap.

Theodore Too was built at Snyder's Shipyard near Lunenberg, N.S., where other famous wooden vessels. the Bluenose and the Bounty, were built. Philip Snyder and his team spent more than a year constructing the tug using shipbuilding methods that date back to 1876. It took 20,515 hours to carefully build Theodore's wooden hull, main deck and wheelhouse. Theodore's giant double measures 65 feet from bow to stern and 22 feet at the beam. Theodore Too is powered by a



400 horsepower engine. The wooden tugboat weighs 105 tonnes.

Theodore Too will be operated by Capt. Bill Stewart and a full-time crew of two. Throughout the summer, the tug will visit ports in Atlantic Canada and the U.S.. Theodore Too is now serving as the Canadian Coast Guard's official safe boating ambassador, teaching children about water safety in a way that is fun and exciting.

If you are in the Maritimes this summer, Theodore Too will be docked at the Maritime Museum of the Atlantic on the downtown Halifax waterfront from June 29 to July 8 and it will be in Georgetown, PEI from July 20 to 22.



Boaters often experience interference and twitching servos, especially when longer servo leads are used. One solution to these problems came from Roger

Fiber optic servo leads eliminate interference and glitches

Forgues of Aerografixs who made an excellent demonstration to club members attending the April meeting.

Mr. Forgues demonstrated his company's fiber optic servo leads. The system consists of an encoder plug that plugs into the receiver, a length of fiber optic cable and a decoder plug that goes just before the servo.

The complete installation is waterproof-good news for boaters like Wally Seddon who just can't seem to keep his boats from going to the bottom!

Because this is a fiber optic system, there is no electrical connection between the radio and servos. Modelers will require a battery for the receiver and a separate battery for the servos.

This new fiber optic servo extension is available for \$50, which includes 48" of cable. For further information, visit the Aerografixs web site at www.aerografixs.com.

Model Boat Show in Clayton

Each August, members travel to Clayton, New York to attend the annual Clayton Antique Boat Show. Coinciding with the boat show is a model boat show that members may wish to participate in. The 4th annual model boat show takes place at the Thousand Islands Museum of Clayton. From Friday August 3 to Sunday, August 5, a wide assortment of model boats from northeastern US and eastern Canada will be on display.

Set up for the show takes place on Thursday, from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm, although some set-up will be permitted Friday morning. If you have a model that is not yet finished, they'd love to have it for a show and tell display.

And the best part? There is no fee to participate in the model boat display and all exhibitors receive free admission to the museum all weekend long.

Of course, while in Clayton you'll want to take in the 37th annual Antique Boat Show. This is the United State's oldest annual Antique Boat Show.

X10 camera is ideal for boats

Members attending the April club meeting saw a demonstration of the XCam2, a wireless video camera that can transmit live colour video and crisp audio signals up to 100 feet. The XCam2 integrates a colour analog video camera, a microphone and 2.4GHz transmitter into a single device that is smaller than a golf ball, all for only \$90, plus \$10 shipping.

The camera is also available with a wide angle lense - the XCam2 WideEye. Whichever you choose, they come with a 12 month warranty and a 30-day money back guarantee. Included in the package is a 2.4GHz wireless camera, a receiver with coax and RCA cable output to connect to your TV or VCR and a power supply.

eBay - Another source of boats and supplies

At just about every club meeting over the winter, some member spoke about buying a hull or boat through the eBay on-line auction web site. Here's a short primer to help you understand how eBay works.

The best way to explore eBay is just to browse. A good place to begin is the categories list. If you know exactly what you're looking for, just enter a couple of words in the Search box located at the top of almost every page.

You can browse all you want, but if you want to bid, you'll need to register first. Registering is free and only takes a couple of minutes. Once you are registered, you can bid on any item you like. Carefully look over what you're bidding on. Enter your maximum bid in the bid box at the bottom of the page.

Then, click on the "Review Bid" button. eBay will bid on your behalf up to your maximum bid. You enter your User

ID and password and then click the "Place Bid" button. That's it! You're done with bidding.

Many people are rightfully concerned about the safety of buying a used item sight unseen. eBay has a number of built-in safeguards every time you buy or sell. Before you buy, you can instantly check the "reputation" or business practices of anyone at eBay. The Feedback Forum is a place where users leave

comments about each other's buying and selling experiences at eBay.

Every eBay user is covered, at no additional cost, by the eBay Fraud Protection Program. If you paid for an item and never received it (or if you received the item, but it's less than what was described), eBay will reimburse buyers up to \$200, less a standard \$25 deductible. An escrow service can give you added security whether you're a buyer or seller in transactions involving expensive items. EBay will hold your payment and send it off to the seller only after you've inspected your merchandise and given your approval.

If you want to bid or browse at eBay, it's free. You don't pay a penny in fees.

So why not browse the eBay site and look for bargains? The web site is at www.ebay.com.
